

#### **Practicing Good Hygiene in Holy Communion**

Please practice good hygiene when receiving Communion. In our Diocese, 'intinction' (dipping the wafer or bread into the wine) is <u>not</u> allowed. We encourage everyone to receive directly from the common cup (chalice) or to receive bread only. There is much less risk of contamination from lips than from hands. Your hands have touched many things—with intinction, the bread has touched your hands, the bread then touches the wine, and a virus can enter along with the bread. If you do not wish to receive the chalice, you can simply place your right hand over your heart while the words of administration are said, and respond with 'Amen' to signal the administrant to move on to the next person.

What is the greatest gift that we as a church can offer a hurting world? I believe it's HOPE. We can offer hope to the poor, the needy, the sick, the depressed, the lonely, the unemployed, the homeless, the lost, the abused, the grieving, the misunderstood and any others that God allows to cross our paths. We can help. You'll notice that I didn't say you can help or I can help, but we can help bring hope. It's called the 'we factor' or teamwork.

The challenges that face us as a congregation demand teamwork. "None of us can do what all of us can do." ~ Max Lucado. Let me repeat that: None of us can do what all of us can do. Jesus' commission to the disciples was: "You [all of you collectively] will be witnesses." ~ Acts 1:8. Jesus works in community. We are in this together. With our three goals of: 1) Feeding the Hungry, 2) Building Bridges with First Nations People, and 3) Improvement in Church Property, we have a huge challenge. But together we can accomplish our goals.

I don't think there's a week that goes by that Pastor Doug and I don't remark about how we would never have gotten through some particular task without 'so-and-so'. The task would have been too daunting, too overwhelming, had we tried to tackle it alone, but with 'his help' or 'her help' we brought it to a successful completion. We see it time and time again as brothers and sisters work together to bring love and hope to those around us. 'Many hands make light work' is what we often say, and it's so true. We have a common concern and we sing a common song. We are one body with many parts.

Max Lucado asks the question: "What if the missing ingredient for changing the world is teamwork?" Matthew 18: 19-20 says, "When two of you get together on anything at all on earth and make a prayer of it, my Father in heaven goes into action. And when two or three of you are together because of me, you can be sure that I'll be there." (Message Bible). The Jerusalem church worked together—they found common ground. And because of that, lives were changed. We too at St. Thomas have an opportunity to do the same. We can change lives. These past few weeks as we've been meeting together to plan our goals for this year, there is such an excitement about the possibilities that we can achieve. Things are happening, lives are being changed, hope is in the air. But we do at times feel a bit overwhelmed because it takes more than a handful of core people to do everything. Remember, 'no one can do everything, but everyone can do something.' One of the best ways that I know of to take your mind off your own problems is to help others. Suddenly, the things that we may struggle with seem less dramatic when we see what others are going through. We are all God's children and we need to work together and be available for those in need.

I would like to conclude with a story. It's about a reporter some years back who was covering the conflict in Sarajevo. He saw a little girl shot by a sniper. The back of her head had been torn away by the bullet. The reporter threw down his pad and pencil and stopped being a reporter for a few minutes. He rushed to the man who was holding the child and helped them both into his car. As the reporter stepped on the accelerator, racing to the hospital, the man holding the bleeding child said, "Hurry, my friend. My child is still alive." A moment or two later he pleaded, "Hurry, my friend. My child is still breathing." A moment later, "Hurry, my friend. My child is still warm." Finally, "Hurry. Oh my God, my child is getting cold."

By the time they arrived at the hospital, the little girl had died. As the two men were in the lavatory, washing the blood off their hands and clothes, the man turned to the reporter and said, "This is a terrible task for me. I must go tell her father that his child is dead. He will be heartbroken." The reporter was amazed. He looked at the grieving man and said, "I thought she was your child." The man looked back and said, "No, but aren't they all our children?"

Indeed. Those who suffer belong to all of us. And if all of us respond, there is HOPE.
