THIS WEEK'S REFLECTION

I've been busy lately being 'creative' with paints and fabrics. Admittedly, some of my 'creations' are better than others, but all of them help put me in a peaceful and thankful frame of mind. I find 'hands on activities' very therapeutic. But regardless of how creative we may be, or what master-pieces we may produce, nothing can compare to the masterpieces of God. He created us and He created the world that we live in, and this is a perfect time of year to give Him thanks for all of it.

I find it easy to thank God for His creation at this time of year. I love the Fall colours and the cooler temperatures. But sometimes it's not so easy to be thankful for the people God created. How thankful are we for the co-worker who belittles us, for the child who rebels against us, for the friend who turns cold towards us, for the parishioner who denigrates us, for the spouse who betrays us, for the stranger who robs us, for all those who in one way or another bring pain into our lives?

The answer to this question is—it's hard, really hard to be thankful. In fact, it's almost impossible to look favourably upon someone who hurts or offends us in some way. And it takes something or should I say Someone 'supernatural' to change our hearts. But God can change our hearts. We, of course, have to be willing to let Him. Brother Lawrence, was a monk who looked at every task in his life, no matter how mundane or routine, as a medium of God's love. And every person he encountered, no matter how difficult, was a child of God to be looked at through His eyes. He is quoted as saying, "I began to live as if there were no one save God and me in the world." Do we see God in every person we encounter? Is it even possible? Brother Lawrence admitted that the path to this union was difficult. He spent years disciplining his heart and mind to yield to God's presence. In his writings he said, "As often as I could, I placed myself as a worshipper before Him, fixing my mind upon His Holy presence, recalling it when I found it wandering from Him. This proved to be an exercise frequently painful, yet I persisted through all difficulties." May we too have that same persistence of heart and mind to see God in all those we encounter.

I want to share with you an entry from 'The Friendship Book' - the author writes:

'One thing I've always particularly liked about our friend Laura is her ability to see the best in everyone. Knowing how difficult that can sometimes be, I once asked her how she managed it. "My family moved around a lot when I was growing up," she told me, "and I often found it really hard to make friends. Then one day my mother told me about the little prayer of a French Jesuit priest called Pierre Teilhard de Chardin. 'Grant me to recognise in others, Lord God, the radiance of your own face.' It never fails to remind me that whatever our differences, we are all children of God. It's simply a matter of looking for the family resemblance." And if we could all take that attitude, how quickly suspicion and divisions would fade away.'

My prayer for this thanksgiving is that as we thank Him for all He has given us—the bounty of the earth and all those He has created—that He will give us in return His eyes to see. The words to a wonderful Christian song by Brandon Health are for all of us:

"Give me your eyes for just one second
Give me your eyes so I can see
Everything that I keep missing
Give me your love for humanity
Give me your arms for the broken hearted
Ones that are far beyond my reach
Give me your heart for the ones forgotten
Give me your eyes so I can see."

6. How would the world be different if people didn't get married?


"There sure would be a lot of kids to explain, wouldn't there?" (Kelvin, age 8)
